**1.0 CALL TO ORDER**

Chairman Borgerding called the meeting to order at 5:33 p.m.

Superintendent Pippen called roll and determined a quorum was present.

**3.0 APPROVAL OF MINUTES**

**3.1 Approval of the Minutes of the May 18, 2015 Meeting of the Park Board  
(Village of Lincolnshire)**

The Park Board reviewed the minutes of the May 18, 2015 meeting. Park Board Member Fell pointed out that the minutes show that Pulte Homes is a client of his employer Christopher Burke Engineering. Village Manager Burke pointed out that Kimley-Horn is the developer, not directly Christopher Burke Engineering. A motion was made by Mr. Fell, seconded by Mr. Campbell, to approve the minutes as presented. The motion was approved by unanimous voice vote.

**6.0 PARKS**

**6.1 Review of the Ten Year Capital Plan for Parks and Paths**

Superintendent Pippen reviewed the draft budget spreadsheet provided to the Park Board. This was prepared by village staff and has not been reviewed or approved by the Mayor and Board. It is not a public document but input is requested from the Park Board about the items listed. After the Park Board has time to review the items the projects can be discussed at the July meeting.

Projects suggested for 2016 include Spring Lake and Whytegate basketball court resurfacing, corridor landscape and entrance sign improvements, the downtown pocket park construction, and continuation of the North Park lighting conduit improvements. The Balzer Park tennis fence is planned for 2016 as well as stormsewer repair at the North Park natural area. Most of the projects are not new amenities but maintaining the existing features. Ms. Siegel asked if there is any assistance for the Pocket Park from the condos in the area of the park. Mr. Pippen said there is not; it is a completion of the planned downtown area. Mr. Burke said the Village is responsible for the materials used, but the actual construction costs are the responsibility of the downtown developer. Ms. Lin asked about the repair of the Rivershire Park fence. Mr. Pippen said this repair work is done year to year from the operating budget and not a capital project item.

### **6.2 Tours of Spring Lake Park, Balzer Park, Bicentennial Park, and Rivershire Park (Village of Lincolnshire)**

The Park Board walked the path through Spring Lake Park. Mr. Pippen noted the recent repairs to the stone work around the eastern end of the pond. He noted the recent installation of the second slide for the swimming area. Mr. Campbell asked if the addition of the second slide would impact the cardboard boat regatta for the Fourth of July festivities. Mr. Pippen said Management Analyst Youssef Shoukry was aware of the change in the configuration of the swimming area and a discussion followed. It was noted that it may be necessary to move the rope line further back to accommodate racers on the Fourth. Mr. Fell asked about how many season passes are sold at the beach each year. Manager Burke noted he did not have that information immediately accessible.

At Balzer Park, Mr. Pippen provided an update on the recent park improvements. He noted the new basketball court, the new playground equipment, recently installed bike rack and drinking fountain. The improvements have been popular and well-used. Mr. Pippen said there are plans to address the drainage concerns and fence around the tennis courts in future years. Ms. Wright asked about tree removal at the park. Mr. Pippen said several ash trees have been removed throughout the park and more removals are needed in the wooded path area behind the park.

At Bicentennial Park Mr. Pippen shared information on the improvements to the park which took place two years ago. He noted the recent tree removal of ash trees in the park. A discussion regarding the possible uses of the open grassy space followed. A soccer goal had been placed several years ago, but the residents in the area appealed to both the Park Board and the Village Board to remove it.

At Rivershire Park, Mr. Pippen provided an overview of this passive use, natural area park. The history of the park includes the original use of the Rivershire Nature Center as the Village administration and police offices, and the adjacent open area as the original sanitary sewer facility. He noted recent improvements done at the shared-use Nature Center in the past year with the cost of the improvements split 50-50 between School District 103 and the Village. He explained plans to renovate the front deck/entrance which should take place this summer. Ms. Lin provided an overview of the number of student programs at the Nature Center during the school year. A discussion regarding repairs to the split rail fence throughout the park and the floating dock followed. Extensive damage occurred at the time of the 2013 flooding. The dock was punctured and is not repairable; it has been removed. The School District used this for student

access to the water for science lessons so replacement of the dock would be appreciated.

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**Summary / Background:**

In May, 2015, Staff received a call from the resident at 2015 Riverwoods Road inquiring about the use of pesticides in Village parks. Staff explained that the Village contracts the majority of weed control applications to licensed companies. The resident requested that Staff meet with representatives from the Midwest Pesticide Action Center (MPAC) to discuss the possibility of a pesticide free park in Lincolnshire.

On June 3rd, Kari Spiegelhalter and Ruth Kerzee from MPAC, along with representatives from Greenwise Organic Lawn Care, met with Scott Pippen, Operations Superintendent, Brad Woodbury, Public Works Director, and Troy Taylor, Facilities Supervisor to discuss the potential for a pesticide-free park program. During this meeting, Staff explained the Village's current program which was deemed very responsible by MPAC. MPAC requested the opportunity to present their program to the Park Board for possible inclusion in the 2016 budget.

**Budget Impact:**

The addition of this program will add approximately \$10,000.00 annually to the operating budget for landscape maintenance.

**Service Delivery Impact:**

This project will not have any impact on the delivery of Public Works services.

**Recommendation:**

The Village needs to follow State purchasing guidelines, so competing price quotes would need to be sought prior to agreeing to this program. Additionally, Staff could explore an in-house program should the Park Board decide the concept of a pesticide free park or park area is something the Village should pursue. Staff would like direction on the concept prior to doing further research that could be presented at a future meeting.

# Guide to a Pesticide-Free Park

From the Midwest Pesticide Action Center

Eiden Park in Evanston, Illinois

Midwest Pesticide Action Center is a 501c3 non-profit organization with the mission to reduce the health risks and environmental impact of pesticides by promoting safer alternatives. As part of that goal, Midwest Pesticide Action Center (MPAC) has developed the Pesticide-Free Parks Program to help park managers move towards the adoption of sustainable turf management practices to reduce the use of synthetic pesticides and fertilizers to lessen their impact on the health of people, pets, and the environment.

The Pesticide-Free Parks program is designed as an educational tool to inform the community about natural lawn care and highlight the park district's (or managing entity's) commitment to healthful and environmentally responsible gathering spaces for the community.

Through a public/private partnership, MPAC launched the first pesticide-free park program with the City of Evanston in 2015 with the designation of five parks as pesticide-free. MPAC created posters and other information materials distributed throughout Evanston's parks to promote the program. In addition, MPAC drafted a press release that was picked up by over 18 media outlets, providing the program with exposure and positive feedback. Our hope is to grow the Pesticide-Free Parks program across the Midwest.

## Why create a pesticide-free park in your community?

Common pesticides used to manage lawns, such as glyphosate (Round-Up), 2,4D and many of the products we know as "weed and feed" have been shown to negatively impact the health of pets and children. As awareness grows around these issues, many residents have stopped using these toxic chemicals on their lawns and have found safer alternatives. However, homeowners and other community members are also concerned about exposing their families to these chemicals when using public spaces such as parks. Adopting the Pesticide-Free Parks program in at least one park provides a safe and healthy space for everyone to enjoy.

Park managers also have a responsibility to address the concerns in the community related to protecting water quality, encourage beneficial insects, and reduce the overall negative impacts of activities on the environment. Adopting the Pesticide-Free Park program in one or more parks helps park managers communicate that commitment in a highly visible way.

A Pesticide-Free Park is a local gathering spot where families can play on the grass freely without concern for exposure to toxic chemicals that may impact their health. A Pesticide-Free Park is a community asset. Together we can create a sustainably managed, safe and healthy park for everyone.

## What exactly is a Pesticide-Free Park?

**We define a pesticide-free park as one that is maintained under the principals of natural lawn care.**

- 1) A park that will be maintained as **pesticide-free for at least one year.**
- 2) A park that will be maintained through **potential collaboration with a local landscaping company**, such as Greenwise Lawn Care, who will donate their organic lawn care expertise and services to park maintenance (not including cost of materials, such as organic fertilizers).
- 3) **A press release** that will be covered by local media outlets, such as newspapers and online journals to draw community attention to the initiative.
- 4) **Signage** to let the community know that the park is being managed without the use of harmful chemicals that could compromise the health of their children and the natural environment.

# Pesticide-Free Park Program in Lincolnshire



On June 3<sup>rd</sup>, Kari Spiegelhalter and Ruth Kerzee from the Midwest Pesticide Action Center, along with representatives from Greenwise Organic Lawn Care, met with Scott Phippen, Operations Superintendent, Brad Woodbury, Public Works Director, and Troy Taylor, Facilities Supervisor to discuss the potential for a pesticide-free park program in the Village of Lincolnshire.

The group discussed potential sites for a pesticide-free park pilot program in Lincolnshire, and found **Spring Lake Park** a good candidate for a pesticide-free park. Spring Lake Park is a popular destination

for residents with families, who picnic on its grounds, swim in the lake, and play baseball on the baseball field. The high-usage of this park makes it a good candidate for the pesticide-free parks program. Greenwise and MPAC visited Spring Park on June 3, 2015 to assess suitability. Greenwise indicated the best areas for management was a total of 40,000 square feet in the southwest section of the park, west of the tennis courts to the treeline along the river, including Landon Field and the surrounding area.

## Roles

In order for the Pesticide-Free Parks program to succeed, each participant has a specific role and responsibilities. They are summarized here:

**Village of Lincolnshire** - The Village of Lincolnshire will seek approvals necessary from Park District personnel or board officials to move forward with the project. Once approved, Lincolnshire will be responsible for the cost of materials used to maintain the park area pesticide-free using sustainable lawn care practices in consultation with Greenwise Lawn Care, a natural lawn care company that will be providing free labor and technical advice for this project. Lincolnshire will also provide an educational component by installing signage indicating that the park being managed sustainably and pesticide-free. In addition, Lincolnshire will support the public awareness campaign developed by MPAC by distributing press releases and providing outlets for other community education..

**Midwest Pesticide Action Center** - MPAC will be responsible for developing community outreach signage and collateral materials to educate the community regarding the project. In collaboration and consultation with Lincolnshire Park District staff, MPAC may develop any or all of the following community outreach pieces: press releases, posters, signage, pamphlets, and other community engagement and awareness activities.

**Greenwise Lawn Care** - Greenwise Lawn Care will provide technical assistance and all labor costs associated with managing one mutually agreed upon park pesticide-free using sustainable lawn and landscaping practices for one year. Greenwise Lawn Care will provide a maintenance plan and timeline for managing Spring Park including an estimated cost of materials. The Village of Lincolnshire will be expected to cover the cost of materials used to maintain the park.

## Timing

We are hoping to launch this program with Lincolnshire in Spring of 2016.

## Pesticide-Free Parks: Cost Estimates\* for Long-Term Signage

### 1. Angle Mount Frame and Post with Plate



**Note:** This option is for an educational sign panel with frame and post. See attached “Guide to Planning Your Interpretive / Information Sign” for helpful tips on organizing images and text. Midwest Pesticide Action Center could coordinate the development and graphic design of this type of signage with municipal / park district partners.

**Cost:** \$426 plus shipping/handling

**Specs:**

\$90 – (Discounts with increased quantity) 18"Hx24"W Tuff panel (premium graphic marking film with Tuff Cover protective overlamine applied to .125" polymetal), output from client prepared file. For use with angle mount frame (below).

\$336 – (Quantity discounts for 10+ only) Standard Angle Mount Frame & Post with Plate for 18"H x24"W x.125" sign panel, 2"x4"x 60" post. 45 degree angle, for in ground installation, black texture powder coat. Aluminum construction.

(12"Hx18"W version would be \$75 + \$302 = \$377 plus shipping/handling)

- 2 MOW 3" OR HIGHER.** This increases root strength and naturally shades out weeds.
- 3 USE ORGANIC FERTILIZERS.** Synthetic fertilizers easily wash away, polluting nearby lakes and streams. Many contain toxic weed killers. Choose an organic fertilizer like compost, alfalfa meal or corn gluten meal\* to capture and deliver nutrients throughout the growing season. Mulch and keep grass clippings on the lawn for an extra boost.
- 4 WEED NATURALLY.** Proper lawn care maintenance naturally eliminates most weeds. Avoid using synthetic herbicides and pesticides, as they can harm other beneficial living things, such as bees, birds, butterflies and fish. Pull weeds using the right tools and fill the hole with grass seed mixed with compost and top soil.



## Come play in our parks to celebrate the 5th anniversary of Evanston's Sustainable Pest Control and Pesticide Reduction Resolution!




As a first step, Evanston has implemented natural lawn care practices, such as mowing higher to strengthen roots and shade out weeds, using non-synthetic fertilizers, and reducing synthetic pesticide use. **Check out Evanston's pesticide-free parks, a pilot organic land management program in partnership with local business Greenwise Organic Lawn Care:**

1. Ackerman Park (Central and McDaniel)
2. Burnham Shores Park (Lake Shore and Burnham)
3. Eiden Park (Sherman and Custer)

5. Trahan Park (Ridge and Monroe)

## City of Evanston Launches Pesticide-Free Parks Pilot Program

(Evanston) The City of Evanston is joining cities across the country including Portland and Seattle as it launches its first pesticide-free parks pilot program with Adopt-a-Park partner and local business Greenwise Organic Lawn Care. The city and Greenwise have chosen five parks to be maintained without the use of pesticides during the one-year pilot program: Ackerman, Burnham Shores, Eiden, Perry, and Trahan. Alternative weed control methods will be used in the selected parks, such as mowing high to increase root strength and naturally shade out weeds, and improving soil health for natural weed resistance.

The overuse and misuse of pesticides is a significant source of chemicals finding their way into the region's lakes, rivers, and streams. The city's pesticide-free parks pilot program will mark the 5<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Evanston's Pesticide Reduction Policy, which solidified Evanston's commitment to protect the health of families and the environment by significantly decreasing the application of pesticides in public spaces, including its parks. If successful in its first year, the pilot program will be extended and could be expanded to include more parks in the future.

Paul D'Agostino, Assistant Director of Public Works, says, "The City of Evanston strives to keep our parks a healthy place for all our residents and visitors to enjoy, and we are excited to launch this Pesticide-Free Parks Pilot Program, which is our largest Adopt-a-Park partnership to date."

Marc Wise, Greenwise's founder and owner says, "Greenwise loves this opportunity to give back to the community we call home and is thrilled to partner with the City of Evanston to promote organic land management. This is a great way to tell the folks of Evanston to get out and enjoy your parks!"

Ruth Kerzee, Midwest Pesticide Action Center's Executive Director says, "Midwest Pesticide Action Center applauds the City of Evanston's commitment to limit the

use of pesticides in order to create healthy places to play. People want pesticide-free parks where they can go with their children and pets and not worry about being exposed.”

**Evanston Residents can follow the city’s example and try these four simple and cost-effective natural lawn care tips in their own yards:**

- **Water 1” PER WEEK:** Water deeply no more than once a week. This practice encourages deep root growth. To measure place an empty tuna or water chestnut can in your yard while watering. When your sprinkler fills it, your watering for the week is done. Water early in the morning to minimize disease problems.
- **Mow 3” High:** Keep your lawn mowed at three inches or higher to increase root strength and naturally shade out weeds. Don’t mow your lawn unless it needs it.
- **Use Organic Fertilizers:** Synthetic fertilizers easily wash away, polluting nearby lakes and streams. Many contain toxic weed killers. Choose an organic fertilizer like compost or alfalfa meal to capture and deliver nutrients in the lawn throughout the growing season. Take a soil test to know exactly what nutrients your lawn needs. Mulch and keep grass clippings on the lawn for an extra boost.
- **Weed Naturally:** Proper lawn care maintenance naturally eliminates most weeds. Avoid using synthetic herbicides and pesticides, as they can harm other beneficial living things such as bees, birds, butterflies and fish. The right tool makes quick work of weeding. After pulling weeds, use grass seed mixed with topsoil to fill in the hole.

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**Summary:**

In 2014, the Village Board adopted a 10-Year Capital Plan for Lincolnshire. This long-term program provides a comprehensive review of long-term capital and equipment needs, and the financial resources needed to support them. The 10-Year Capital Plan details expenditures for all Village owned facilities as well as major vehicles and equipment purchases. Throughout the year, Staff evaluates, reviews, and revises the Village's 10-Year Capital Plan.

Section 2-4-4 of the Village Code, Park Board Powers and Duties, states in part: The Village Park Board shall prepare and recommend to the Village Board from time to time plans for specific improvements of the park and recreational facilities, and To provide and supervise the care and maintenance of all Village property designated for park or recreational use. Attached is a copy of the 10-Year Capital Plan update for the Parks and Paths, Facilities, and Equipment. Staff is requesting Park Board members review the attachments prior to Monday night's meeting and provide input on the plan as it relates to Section 2-4-4 of the Village Code.

The following is a brief summary of significant changes and additions to the original 10-Year Capital Plan approved by the Village Board in 2014:

**Infrastructure – Parks & Paths**

**Significant Changes:**

Acct# 51-22-86-6401 – North Park Drainage Improvements (Construction) – Staff underestimated the anticipated cost of this project. The improvements require a large amount of permitting and coordination between Lake County, Illinois Department of Natural Resources and Lake County Stormwater Management. Staff utilized \$15,000 in the current fiscal year to perform the engineering, permitting and coordination of this project. Additionally, staff added a line item in the amount of \$55,000 to the 2016 budget to address the cost of Phase II construction of this project.

**New 2025 Projects:**

North Park Foul Ball Netting Replacement - \$10,000  
North Park Athletic Field – Lighting Upgrades - \$250,000



**Equipment Fund**

Significant Changes:

The Toro 3505 D Riding Mower #707 was scheduled to be replaced in 2015. Staff re-evaluated this mower and concluded this item does not need to be replaced and will be moved to an outlying year in the 10-Year Capital Plan. Additionally, as stated above, the 25-yard leaf machines as well as all other leaf machines may ultimately be eliminated from the 10-Year Capital Plan should the Village pursue outsourcing this service.

- Wheel Balancer - \$10,000
- Wells Cargo Trailer #264 - \$15,000
- Artic Cat Utility Cart #415 - \$18,500
- Bobcat Utility Cart #417 - \$28,000
- Beefco Slit Seeder #711 - \$20,000

**Facilities Fund**

Significant Changes:

Acct# 51-25-80-2103 – Shake Roof Replacement Village Hall – This project will not proceed in Fiscal Year 2015. Staff’s budget estimate of \$280,000 was significantly under budget. When Staff obtained the initial budget number, the firm’s estimate erred by not including Prevailing Wage.

New 2025 Projects:

- Village Hall - HVAC A/C & Controller Replacement - \$130,000
- Public Works Facility Overhead Door Replacement - \$30,000

**Recommendation:** Approval and recommendation to the Village Board of the updates to the current 10-Year Capital Plan for Parks and Paths, Facilities, and Equipment.
